

First Reading

Genesis 22:1-14

 $oldsymbol{\Box}$ od tested Abraham. He said to him, "Abraham!" And he said, "Here I am." He said, "Take your son, your only son Isaac, whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah, and offer him there as a burnt offering on one of the mountains that I shall show you." So Abraham rose early in the morning, saddled his donkey, and took two of his young men with him, and his son Isaac; he cut the wood for the burnt offering, and set out and went to the place in the distance that God had shown him. On the third day Abraham looked up and saw the place far away. Then Abraham said to his young men, "Stay here with the donkey; the boy and I will go over there; we will worship, and then we will come back to you." Abraham took the wood of the burnt offering and laid it on his son Isaac, and he himself carried the fire and the knife. So the two of them walked on together. Isaac said to his father Abraham, "Father!" And he said, "Here I am, my son." He said, "The fire and the wood are here, but where is the lamb for a burnt offering?" Abraham said, "God himself will provide the lamb for a

burnt offering, my son." So the two of them walked on together.

When they came to the place that God had shown him, Abraham built an altar there and laid the wood in order. He bound his son Isaac, and laid him on the altar, on top of the wood. Then Abraham reached out his hand and took the knife to kill his son. But the angel of the Lord called to him from heaven, and said, "Abraham, Abraham!" And he said, "Here I am." He said, "Do not lay your hand on the boy or do anything to him; for now I know that you fear God, since you have not withheld your son, your only son, from me." And Abraham looked up and saw a ram, caught in a thicket by its horns. Abraham went and took the ram and offered it up as a burnt offering instead of his son. So Abraham called that place "The Lord will provide"; as it is said to this day, "On the mount of the Lord it shall be provided."

Second Reading

Romans 6:12-23

Since Do not let sin exercise dominion in your mortal bodies, to make you obey their passions. No longer present your members to sin as instruments of wickedness, but present yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life, and present your members to God as instruments of righteousness. For sin will have no dominion over you, since you are not under law but under grace.

What then? Should we sin because we are not under law but under grace? By no means! Do you not know that if you present yourselves to anyone as obedient slaves, you are slaves of the one whom you obey, either of sin, which leads to death, or of obedience, which leads to righteousness? But thanks be to God that you, having once been slaves of sin, have become obedient from the heart to the form of teaching to which you were entrusted, and that you, having been set free from sin, have become slaves of righteousness. I am speaking in human terms because of your natural limitations. For just as you once presented your members as slaves to impurity and to greater and greater iniquity, so now present your members as slaves to righteousness for sanctification.

When you were slaves of sin, you were free in regard to righteousness. So what advantage did you then get from the things of which you now are ashamed? The end of those things is death. But now that you have been freed from sin and enslaved to God, the advantage you get is sanctification. The end is eternal life. For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Notes on the Service

Fifth Sunday after Pentecost

Gen 22:1-14 • Ps 13 • Rom 6:12-23 • Mtt 9:35 - 10:40-42

In describing the church as built "upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets" this Sunday's collect alludes to St. Peter and St. Paul the Apostles, whose feast was June 29.

Last Sunday's first reading was the terrible tale of the near-death of Abraham's first son, Ishmael in the wilderness in the sight of his mother. To-day's is the more terrible tale of the near-death of Abraham's second son (although God calls him his "only son") Isaac in the wilderness in the sight, and by the hand, of his father. In each episode, at the last minute, God rescues the lad. The narrator's spare style heightens the dread.

Isaac's laughter turns to terror as his father binds him to an altar. Freudian and Jungian interpreters have mined the "myth" of the near-sacrifice of Isaac for subconscious fears and archetypes. Various theological commentators have read it as a test of Isaac's stoic fortitude (Josephus); as a prefiguring of Christ's crucifixion (Augustine); as a test of Abraham's faith (Hebrews, Kierkegaard). Following James Frazier, some anthropologists see it as a drama about the discontinuation of child sacrifice, an abomination practiced in Jerusalem according to II Kings as late as the 7thcentury, a century after the Elohist school had written down Genesis 22, and two centuries after the Yahwist school had legislated the abolition of child sacrifice in Exodus 13:13 & 34:20.

Important as Abraham is, only one psalm, #105, discusses him. Psalm 13:1-4 is a cry of distress, such as someone in Isaac's situation, but with more time than Isaac, might think. At the end, the psalmist's mood turns from desperation to faith. God will intervene, he assures himself.

Paul observes that human beings must be either slaves of sin or slaves of God. The former are on their way to death, the latter on their way to resurrection. Then Paul examines the argument that because we are under grace, not law, we may do whatever we wish. "Antinomianism" is the term for the heresy which claimed that because Christians were free of the law, they were allowed do even things immoral under conventional ethics. Slaves of righteousness would not behave unrighteously, is Paul's rebuttal.

After Jesus' arduous injunctions about the high cost of discipleship and the likelihood of persecution which formed the Gospels of the last two Sundays, we read today the end of Matthew 10, promising that whoever gives a prophet or a righteous man even a drink of water will be rewarded. Such charitable people, as well as Peter and Paul, are parts of the spiritual temple to which today's collect refers.
